

STAGE 1

THE APACHE KID

The Apache Kid was said to have been the fiercest Apache next to Geronimo. Born in the early 1860s, he served as an Apache scout for the Army from 1881-1887. In 1887, Kid's father was killed by another Apache in a drunken celebration. His friends killed the man but the Apache Kid was not satisfied. He went and killed the guy's brother. After several stays in prison, Kid escaped in 1889 while being transported to Yuma. That was his last "official sting". It is believed the Apache Kid was still raiding herds in the southwest into the 1920s. No one is sure of when he died.

Pistols	10 rounds, holstered
Rifle	10 rounds, staged on haystack
Shotgun	6+ rounds staged on horse

Shooter starts at center of hitching post with one hand pointed downrange and the other hand on a pistol. Shooter says, "Injuns!". ATB, with 1st pistol engage the Indian pistol targets with a "Dang-It-Dan Sweep" (1 on 1, 1 on 2, 2 on 1, 1 on 2). Holster. With 2nd pistol, engage the 2 Indians with 1 round each and the remaining 3 on the square target. Holster. Move to haystack and with shotgun engage the 4 shotgun poppers. PMF. With safe shotgun, move to the left of the horse and engage the remaining 2 poppers.. PMF. Place safe shotgun on horse. With the rifle, engage the rifle targets in the same sequence as the pistols: First 5 with a Dang-It-Dan sweep, THEN, 1 on 1, 1 on 2 and 3 on the circle.




STAGE 2

THE DODGE CITY GANG

The Dodge City Gang of Las Vegas, New Mexico was a group of gamblers, ruffians and unsavory characters. Beginning in 1879, the Doge City Gang, named because of violent reputations earned from the Kansas cow towns began 2 years of stagecoach and train robberies, organized cattle rustling and were responsible for multiple murders and lynchings. The gang eventually included a judge, several peace officers and outlaws. In April of 1880, the citizens organized a group of vigilantes. They posted a rather stern warning to the thieves and murderers and it seems they left town.

Pistols 10 rounds, holstered
Rifle 10 rounds, staged on gun rack
Shotgun 4+ rounds staged on table

Shooter starts in shooters' box. Shooters says, "Time to clear out, boys". ATB, move to left crossfire window. With pistols, engage the pistol targets with a 4 on 1, 3 on 2, 2 on 1, 1 on 2 sweep, starting on either target. Holster. Pick up safe rifle and at the right crossfire window, engage the rifle targets in the same sequence as the pistols. Restage safe rifle on table. With shotgun, engage poppers. PMF.




STAGE 3

BILL BOOTH – SLAYER OF WYOMING

This was one fine fellow. To start his escapades, he murdered his Indian (Pawnee) wife and child in Ohio. He then left a trail of death through Oklahoma and Wyoming. On one occasion, he bashed in a friend's head, then put 3 rounds in him for good measure. He was finally arrested in Montana whereupon he was extradited to Wyoming, where he was tried, sentenced and hanged.

Pistols 10 rounds, holstered
Rifle 10 rounds, staged in right jail window
Shotgun 6+ rounds staged in left jail window

Shooter starts in shooter's box. Shooter says, "Your time is up". ATB, move to either the rifle or shotgun station. Rifle: Engage rifle targets with a 1,3,2,3,1 sweep starting on either end. Make rifle safe. Shotgun: Engage poppers. PMF. Make shotgun safe. Pistols: Engage pistol targets with the same sequence as the rifle. Holster pistols.




STAGE 4

THE BLOODY ESPINOSAS

The Espinosas were from Vera Cruz, Mexico. There, 6 of their family members died in a U.S. Naval bombardment during the Mexican-American War. They moved to Colorado where in 1863 they started killing travelers on the high plains. They said their land claims were not being honored. Eventually their murder count ran to 32. They would mutilate the corpses and hack the hearts out from their victims. Famous tracker Tom Tobin was finally hired to bring the Espinosas in. He brought in their heads for which he received about \$1,500 (about \$25,000 in today's money).

Pistols 10 rounds, holstered
Rifle 10 rounds, staged on wagon
Shotgun 4+ rounds staged on wagon

Shooter starts in front of horse-drawn wagon with hands at Texas surrender. Shooter says, "I'm taking you in". ATB, with pistols, triple tap the 2 outside targets and with remaining 4 rounds single tap the inside 3 targets. Holster pistols. Move to wagon and with rifle, engage the rifle targets with the same sequence as the pistols. Place safe rifle back on wagon. Pick up shotgun and move past the rear of the wagon. Engage poppers. PMF.




STAGE 5

GEORGE “RED BUCK” WEIGHTMAN

We don't know when the “Red” was brought into this world, but we do know when he went out. Red ran roughshod through Oklahoma and Texas in the early to mid-1890s. He was thrown out of the infamous Dooley Gang because of his nasty ways. Imagine that. Red liked killing, robbing, thieving and rustling with a passion. Red Buck was involved in several gun battles with the U.S. Marshals in Oklahoma and also with the Texas Rangers. His evil ways caught up with him when he was killed by U.S. Deputy Marshal Joe Ventioner (who was wounded in the fight) in his final gun battle in 1896.

Pistols 10 rounds, holstered
Rifle 10 rounds, staged on right ammo box
Shotgun 6+ rounds staged on left ammo box

Shooter starts behind right ammo box, hands at Texas surrender. Shooter says, “You're mine now, Red!”. ATB, engage the pistol targets with a 1,3,1 sweep from either direction. Holster. With rifle, engage rifle targets with a triple tap sweep, with the 10th round on the cowboy. Make rifle safe. Move to left ammo box and engage pistol targets with the same sequence as the first pistol. Holster. Pick up shotgun, move in between cacti and engage shotgun poppers PMF.




STAGE 6

THE LEE BROTHERS

Brothers James, Tom and Pink (yes, Pink) operated out of Cooke County, Texas and the Chickasaw Indian Nation to the north. The gang members were major rustlers of cattle from nearby ranchers and the Indians. They had no regard for authority, ambushing a posse and killing 3 of the 5. All 3 brothers were eventually killed in shootouts with lawmen – Tom in one, and Jim and Pink in another in 1885. The gang was linked to possibly 40 murders.

Pistols 10 rounds, holstered
Rifle 10 rounds, staged in right window
Shotgun 4+ rounds staged in left window

Shooter starts between facades, hands on hat. Shooter says, “Damn those Lee Brothers”. ATB, with 1st pistol engage pistol targets with 2 rounds on the center target then single tap the 3 targets on either side of center for 3 rounds. Holster. With 2nd pistol, repeat sequence using the opposite 2 targets from center for the 3 rounds. Holster. move to either rifle or shotgun. Rifle: Shot in the same sequence as pistols. Restage safely. Shotgun: Engage poppers. PMF. Restage safely.
